 - Example 2 There is a widespread belief that climate change is real and caused by human activity.

 - The **barren** wasteland is a symbol of the destruction of the environment.

- 1. selfish: caring only about yourself and not about other people used to show disapproval
 - > Her selfish attitude made it difficult for her to maintain meaningful relationships.
- 2. evident: easy to see, notice, or understand
 - Example 2 The danger was clearly evident from the smoke and flames.
- 3. subjective: based on your own feelings and ideas and not on facts.
 - > The quality of the wine is a matter of **subjective** evaluation.
- 4. appropriate : correct or suitable for a particular time, situation, or purpose
 - > It is appropriate for any employee to dress well for the job interview.
- 5. urgent : very important and needing to be dealt with immediately
 - 🕦 It is <u>urgent</u> a new vaccine should be developed to fight the spread of the virus.

 - An organization should promote legitimate business practices.

 - Example 2 The new technology will revolutionize the automotive industry.
- 3. mature: to start behaving like an adult and become more sensible as you get older
 - with age and life experiences, individuals often mature mentally.
- 4. integrate: to connect or combine two or more things so that together they form an effective unit or system
 - Effective learning involves integrating new knowledge and existing understanding.
- 5. inherit: to have qualities, physical features, etc. that are similar to those of your parents, grandparents, etc.
 - She inherited a passion for music from her grandfather.

 - The researcher will **conduct** a survey to gather opinions from the participants.
- 3. prevent : to stop something from happening.
 - Regular cleaning may help **prevent** infection.
- 4. compensate for : to replace or balance the effect of something bad.
 - > The team was able to **compensate** for their lack of speed with superior technique.
- 5. disrupt: to interrupt something and prevent it from continuing by creating a problem.
 - The introduction of a new species could disrupt the ecosystem.
